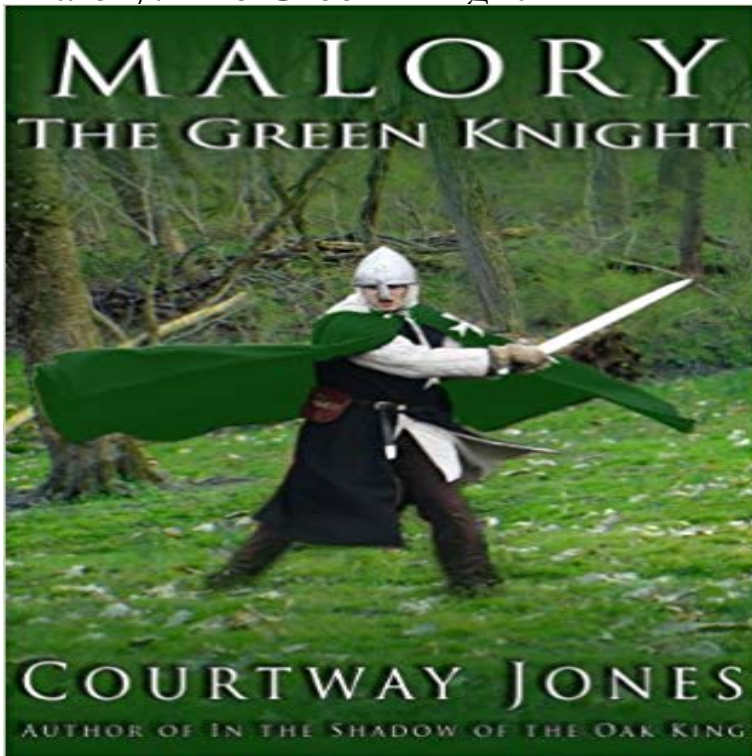


Malory: The Green Knight
